#### GARFIELD'S PIN BLOCK RESTORER

If you have determined conditions warrant the use of this product in a grand plane, then you might be interested in the following:

Turn the piano over and apply the pin block restorer in the underside of the pin block, being right-side up now. The holes act as little cups for the solution with no messy run-off. Make one pass, wait a week, do another pass, wait another week, then turn the piano back over and tune as necessary. Also, it is a good idea to put towels on the floor just in case the restorer wants to leaks out from the other side of the pin block.


Sometimes I really like my job!

Part I: Hammer Technique

"...I tune uprights with my left hand and grands with my right hand. In this manner I only suffer half of the fatigue of a tuner who can only do it right handed. (60% of the pianos I tune are uprights and 40% are grands.) Tuning a upright with your left hand is similar to lifting a weight, whereas tuning it with your right hand you have to pull down on a weight. I personally find pulling down to be much more difficult. In grand planes I tune right handed because the tuning hammer in this position imitates that of tuning the upright with the left hand...."

(Editor's note: The different approaches others have of doing this job continue to astonish me.)
